## Australian Parliament Joint Standing Committee on Migration Submission no. 209

Thank you for the opportunity of making a submission to your Inquiry.

I support the Federal Governments Immigration policy in general but have serious misgivings about the migrants of an Islamic nature that fail to identify as an Australian and more especially those of the 2<sup>nd</sup> generation.

The failure to 'capture' these subsequent generations as Australians is due to something lacking in the general education process or radicalisation by militant Imams or possibly a mixture of both.

It seems to me that the lack of integration by an immigrant is always the fault of the host country with little or not consideration on the attitude or behaviour of the immigrant.

One suggestion to address this is apply more strict entry regulations – more skilled or highly skilled migrants with commensurate education, able to speak more than passable English which would give them a better chance of employment
