Bioprospecting

Can prospecting among Australia's plants, animals and microbes to find valuable substances be turned into a money-spinner and job creator?

The House of Representatives Primary Industries, chaired by Fran Bailey MP, is investigating the potential of bioprospecting, bioprocessing and other related biotechnologies to create new industries and jobs, especially in regional Australia.

Because of recent technological advances and better understanding of the natural world, it is now possible to thoroughly and systematically 'search' biological materials for useful chemicals and activity. These materials can be used to create or improve products ranging from pharmaceuticals to sunscreens to plastics.

And because of our great biodiversity, Australia is perfectly placed to be at the forefront of this process.

The House Primary Industries Committee will hold a public hearing in **Canberra** this **Wednesday**, **27 June**, to hear **AFFA's (Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Australia)** views on developing high technology industries in regional Australia based on bioprospecting, bioprocessing and other related biotechnologies. This hearing will be the committee's second with AFFA. It will focus on AFFA's vision for the development of regional bioindustries, and the regimes that are being put in place to improve access to biological resources and ensure that the benefits from exploiting them are shared fairly and equitably.

As part of its inquiry, the Committee is also visiting regional areas to hear the views of bioprospectors, researchers, and business people, and to see existing industries based on bioprospecting.
