Dear Chairman,

Congratulations on calling for the enquiry into Water Management in Australia.

We submit that there is evidence that there are several major catchments of national importance that are being effected by industrial and urban influences in the upper atmosphere.

The November 1998 Bulletin of the American Meterological Society (Volume 79 Number 11), printed a paper by Professor Daniel Rosenfeld and Itamar M. Lensky titled "Satellite-Based Insights into Precipitation Formation Processes in Continental and Maritime Convective Clouds".

The paper details the science and findings of the effects of aerosols on the performance of clouds after impact by wild fires and urban and industrial pollution.

Professor Rosenfeld has provided evidence that Australia is not quarantined from these impacts. Indeed his work clearly demonstrates impacts over many of our most critical catchments that our urban, industrial and agricultural communities depend upon.

We propose that it is of National importance that Governments immediately implement cloud seeding trials and proofing work that will remediate the impacts of decline in precipitation due to human pursuits on our continent.
