## Inquiry into increasing participation in paid employment

Thank-you for inviting me to make a submission to the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Employment and Workplace Relations inquiry into increasing participation in paid employment.

I wish to address the issue of very long term unemployment in Australia. I have five main points.

- 1. There has been a rising trend in the number of unemployed people who have been without a job for over 2 years in Australia since the 1970s. A large proportion of them have been without stable employment since leaving school.
- 2. Both Australian and overseas evaluations of labour market programs have shown that their effect on the ability of these very long term unemployed people to gain a job is modest. Moreover, the effect on the very long term unemployed's ability to retain a job for longer than 12 months is almost negligible. These programs include job counselling, job training, short-term wage subsidies and short term job creation.
- 3. Anecdotal evidence suggests that many of these people have chronic social, educational and health problems that are not going to be resolved by short-term employment programs.
- 4. Nonetheless, stable employment is an important ingredient in their longer term rehabilitation.
- 5. At present, the only known way to ensure most of these people retain on-going jobs is either to offer them public employment or to organise for large commercial organisations to each employ a limited number of them.

I have attached an article by Michael Dockery and myself which provides a discussion of these issues.
