

Thanks for talking to me. I just wanted to add the following points to my evidence at the enquiry last week.

- 1. I was asked who I had found helpful and I nominated two members of the House of representatives but forgot to mention Senator Ian MacDonald who was very helpful each time I could not get through to various departments to solve issues. He was extremely helpful and understanding of the issues.
- 2. I do not think that the work of this Committee will be unnecessary and solved, particularly, by the improved numbers of medical graduates for the following reasons:
- a) the number of graduates has increased but the male to female ratio has changed and therefor the total number of full-time equivalents will not change as much as would be expected from past experience
- b) there is evidence that recent graduates choose to work less hours and less overtime, this coupled with safe hours campaigns reduces the number of full-time equivalents
- c) most graduates choose to work in metropolitan Australia so the effect on the regions will be less despite the number of graduates increasing
- d) services are being centralised for fiscal reasons and this will make regions less attractive
- e) specialist training is longer and more complex with sub specialisation the norm rather than the production of generalists as in the past
