During the private meeting between the Committee and the Australian Private Hospitals Association (APHA) on 1 June 2005, Members requested the provision of additional information. On behalf of APHA, I have provided the additional information requested below.

1. Number of medical patients treated in the private and public hospital sectors

In 2003-04, private hospitals treated 24.7% of medical patients, an increase from the 21.5% treated in 1999-00.

In 2003-04, private hospitals provided 31.5% of all overnight separations (with 32% of total beds). This compares to the 29.7% of overnight separations provided by private hospitals in 1999-00.
