COMMUNITY CONSULTATION REPORT FOR DEFENCE SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY ORGANISATION (DSTO) HUMAN PROTECTION AND PERFORMANCE DIVISION (HPPD) SECURITY AND FACILITIES UPGRADE

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This letter is to inform the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works (PWC) about the nature and extent of community consultation undertaken as part of the DSTO HPPD Security and Facilities Upgrade.

In view of the location of the site, the largely internal nature of the works and the likely low level impact on local residents the focus of communication was conducted at the key stakeholder level, as identified in annex A. The closest zoning for potential future residential development is approximately 800m from the site on the far side of the Westgate freeway.

Broadly, the strategy for community consultation adopted by Defence was undertaken with the objectives of:

- ensuring that key stakeholders were informed about the project;
- providing an opportunity to discuss issues that directly affect them;
- ensuring an opportunity was provided to raise any concerns; and
- addressing these concerns as appropriate.

Four main activities were undertaken:

- contact was established with key stakeholders and an outline of the project was provided;
- more detailed briefing meetings with interested parties were arranged;
- detailed face to face briefings with interested stakeholders were conducted; and
- stakeholders were provided with the opportunity to respond and raise any comments or concerns.

Defence is satisfied that all reasonable steps to inform the community about the DSTO HPPD Security and Facilities Upgrade Project were taken. No significant issues were raised through Defence's community consultations and as a result no changes to the project were required.

A more detailed briefing on methodology, the DSTO HPPD Communications Strategy and outcomes can be provided to the Committee upon request.

Under this process, Defence is required to achieve both Government and Parliamentary approval prior to constructing the works. Defence is not required to seek approval from the Victorian Local or State Governments; however, representatives from the Melbourne City Council, Places Vic, and the Member for Albert Park have been consulted on the proposed works. Defence also contacted the Federal Member for Melbourne Ports, the Honourable Martin Foley.
