## **Question:**

**Senator Brandis:** As you know, there is no constitutional recognition of the office of Deputy Prime Minister, or indeed, for that matter, Prime Minister. The constitution only recognises ministers. So from a strict point of view it might be thought that this is an extra-constitutional title but what it does is designate that the occupier is the second the minister of the Crown for the time being.

**Senator WONG:** On your assertion, then, does that mean that Mr Joyce could appoint anybody in the ministry—even an assistant minister—to be Deputy Prime Minister?

Senator Brandis: I do not know the answer to that question. Let me take it on notice and I will consider it.

**CHAIR:** Thank you. Are there further question on the matter we were dealing with?

**Senator McALLISTER:** In the period 1 to 7 April when Mr Joyce used this instrument, was he in the country?

Senator Brandis: I do not know. I will take it on notice.

Ms Kelly: We understand he was on leave. We cannot take it any further than that.

**Senator McALLISTER:** Perhaps you can get back to us later in the day, if that is possible.

Senator Brandis: We will confirm what Ms Kelly's understanding was. The answer was given a little

tentatively, but I am sure Ms Kelly can confirm that and give you a firm answer.

Ms Kelly: Yes, we will endeavour to do that.

## Answer:

The Acts Interpretations Act 1901 provides mechanisms whereby ministers may authorise other ministers to act on their behalf for the purpose of the exercise of statutory powers.

Mr Joyce was on leave from 1 to 7 April 2017. The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet is not aware whether Mr Joyce was in Australia or overseas during that period.
