Senator Pratt asked the following question at the hearing on 12 December 2016:

Questions for the department:

- 1. Is Whatsapp on the Australian Signals Directorate (ASD) list of approved platforms for cabinet and sensitive communications?
- 2. Where are Whatsapp's servers located?
- 3. What are the risks that the use of non-secure communication platforms, rather than secure government servers, presents to Australia's security?
- 4. Are the Prime Minister and his Ministers defying the advice of one of the Government's key national security advisers that even unclassified information should not be shared on non-ASD approved platforms if that information is sensitive?

Questions to Senator Brandis:

- 5. Do you use Whatsapp or any other communication application not currently approved by the ASD?
- 6. Why isn't the Prime Minister ensuring that his Ministers are complying with their integrity obligations?

The answer to the honourable senator's question is as follows:

1. No. The Australian Signals Directorate (ASD) has not performed a formal assessment of Whatsapp.

2. The Attorney-General's Department is not aware of the location of Whatsapp's servers.
