ACTING CHAIR: I want to come back to you, Ms Freeman: how did this pilot program end up at Southern Cross?

Senator SIEWERT: The minister asked for it.

ACTING CHAIR: You mentioned a lot of bureaucratic processes.

Ms Freeman: When the program was announced, RIRDC was engaged to do some extensive industry consultation and come up with a program framework. In October last year, the minister asked Mr Hogan to assist him and provide advice on this measure, and Mr Hogan undertook an extensive consultation process of his own.

He had provided his report to the minister just prior to Christmas—again, that was all tabled in the QONs—on where he thought Southern Cross University may have merit potentially, and the minister asked us to investigate that.

ACTING CHAIR: An extensive consultation process.

Ms Freeman: We are happy to provide you with details of consultation that has been undergone, but a lot of that was provided in the QONs from February estimates.

Answer:

It was a decision of government that Southern Cross University deliver the Farm Co-operatives and Collaboration pilot program. The department ensured that:

- the grant approval process for Southern Cross University adhered to the mandatory requirements of the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013 (PGPA Act) and the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines (CGRGs)
- the proposed expenditure would be a proper (efficient, effective, economical and ethical) use of relevant money
- the proposal had the appropriate policy, legislative and constitutional authority.

The program design process involved extensive consultation with farmers and key stakeholder groups, through roundtables and direct dialogue, from July 2015 up until the approval of the grant on 18 April 2016. This information was provided in answers to Questions on Notice from the Additional Estimates hearings held in February 2016 (QoNs 5, 6 and 13).
