Answer:

The Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment has been advised that the return of pallets into circulation has reduced as a result of COVID-19 lockdowns and associated interruptions to supply chains. The department has not been able to establish an 'ideal number' of pallets required.

Industry estimates that the domestic pallet pool consists of around 16 million pallets which support around 56 million pallet uses each year. The department understands that Australia produces around 2 million pallets per year for the food supply chain and around 10 million pallets per year for other products, a large proportion of which are used for delivering product to export markets.

The department has heard claims that timber availability is limiting capacity to produce additional pallets, but the department has not been able to verify the extent of any reductions in pallet production. Forest industries have foreshadowed that reductions in native forest harvesting in Victoria as it transitions out of native forestry by 2030 may result in a reduction in hardwood pallet production.

Softwood pallets are manufactured in South Australia, Western Australia, New South Wales and Queensland. The largest producer of hardwood pallets is in Victoria, with other manufacturing facilities in New South Wales and Tasmania.
