- 1. The House met pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair.
- 2. PRESENTATION OF ADDRESS TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.—Mr. Speaker reported that he had, that day, waited upon His Excellency the Governor-General, and had presented to him the Address of the House of Representatives, in reply to His Excellency's Speech on the Opening of Parliament, agreed to on the 5th June instant, and that His Excellency had been pleased to make the following reply:-

TO THE HONORABLE THE SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA.

GENTLEMEN:

It is highly gratifying to me to receive your Address in Reply to the Speech delivered by me on the occasion of the Opening of The Parliament of the Commonwealth; and I thank you for your pleasing assurances of loyalty to the Throne and Person of the Sovereign.

I earnestly hope that the result of your considerations of the various measures submitted

to Parliament will prove of much benefit to the people of Australia.

3.
