### TUESDAY, 1st SEPTEMBER, 1903.

1. The House met pursuant to adjournment.-Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2. PETITION.-Mr. Page presented a Petition from W. P. Colborne and others, styling themselves respectively President and executive officers of the Brisbane Labour Council, praying that the Conciliation and Arbitration Bill may be amended so as to equally apply to all vessels engaging in the Australian coastal trades, whether Australian, oversea, or foreign.
