Customs Tariff (South African Preference)-

Mr. Pratten moved, That on and after the first day of July One thousand nine hundred and twenty-six at nine o'clock in the forenoon, Victorian time, in lieu of the duties of Customs imposed by the Customs Tariff (South African Preference) 1906 and the Tariff Proposals proposed in the House of Representatives on the following dates, namely:—

3rd December, 1914 (relating to the Tariff on goods imported from, and the produce or manufacture of, the Union of South Africa); and

25th September, 1918 (relating to the Tariff on goods imported from, and the produce or manufacture of, the Union of South Africa),

upon goods to which that Act or either of those Proposals applies, there be collected on those goods the duties of Customs imposed by the Customs Tariff 1921-1924, or, where the duties imposed by that Act are amended by the amendment to which this resolution applies, the duties of Customs imposed by that Act as so amended.

This resolution applies to the first amendment to the Customs Tariff 1921-1924 passed after the date of this resolution.

For the purposes of this resolution, duties of Customs collected in pursuance of the Tariff Proposals proposed in the House of Representatives on the 3rd March, 1926, or of any amendments to those Proposals, shall be deemed to be duties of Customs imposed by an amendment of the Customs Tariff 1921-1924.
