4. MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.—STATES CRANTS BILL.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker :-

STONEHAVEN,

Governor-General.

Message No. 57.

In accordance with the requirements of section 56 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purpose of amendments to be moved by the Treasurer to a Bill for an Act to amend the Surplus Revenue Act 1910, to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund sums for the purposes of Financial Assistance to States, and for other purposes.

Melbourne, 2nd March, 1927.

Ordered - That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, at the next sitting.
