VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS  
OF THE  
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

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THURSDAY, 13TH OCTOBER, 1927.

1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Sir Littleton Groom) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
2. PAPER.—The following Paper was presented, pursuant to Statute—  
Wine Export Bounty Act—Return for 1926-27.
3. ABORIGINES OF AUSTRALIA—JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE.—Mr. Jackson moved, pursuant to notice, amended—
  - (1) That, in view of the fast increasing death rate among the aboriginal tribes in Australia, and the urgent need for their protection against disease and other effects brought about by the populating of areas which for centuries have been their hunting grounds, a Joint Select Committee be appointed to inquire into—
    - (a) the segregation in large areas in the Northern Territory of its present aboriginal population ;
    - (b) co-operation with States in matters affecting the welfare of aboriginal tribes ;
    - (c) the half-caste problem ;
    - (d) allocation of assistance to Aboriginal Mission Stations ;
    - (e) any other matters which will assist the welfare of aborigines and half-castes.
  - (2) That three Members of the House of Representatives be appointed to serve on such Committee, and that such Members shall be Mr. Aubrey Abbott, Mr. Forde, and the Mover.
  - (3) That the Committee have power to send for persons, papers, and records, to move from place to place, and to sit during any adjournment of the Parliament.
  - (4) That a Message be sent to the Senate requesting its concurrence, and asking that two Members of the Senate be appointed to serve upon such Committee.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Marr (Minister for Home and Territories), addressing the House, and not having concluded his speech, the House ordered that the honorable Member have leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed.

Ordered—That the debate be now adjourned, and that the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for a later hour this day.

It being two hours after the time fixed for the meeting of the House, the Orders of the Day (General Business) were called on, in accordance with Standing Order No. 119.

4. TITLES, GRANTING OF.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the following motion of Mr. McGrath:—
  - (1) That, in the opinion of this House, the granting of titles is contrary to the sentiment of the citizens of Australia.
  - (2) That the above resolution be conveyed to His Gracious Majesty King George through His Excellency the Governor-General—

5. **POSTPONEMENT OF ORDERS OF THE DAY.**—Ordered—That Orders of the Day Nos. 2 and 3, General Business, be postponed until Thursday, 3rd November next.6. **RAILWAY THROUGH CENTRAL QUEENSLAND TO NORTH-SOUTH LINE.**—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the following motion of Mr. Manning:—That it is essential for the proper development of Northern Australia that a railway be constructed from Bourke, New South Wales, through Central Queensland towards Cloncurry and thence across the Barkly Tablelands to a point on the North-South Railway in the Northern Territory—the carrying of this resolution to be taken as an instruction from this House to the Government to approach the State Governments of New South Wales and Queensland with a view of apportioning the expense of constructing this line between the Commonwealth and the States mentioned—*And on the Amendment moved thereto by Mr. Gregory, viz.:*—Omit all the words after “constructed from” up to and inclusive of the words “Northern Territory” and insert in place thereof “Broome or Derby starting in an easterly direction up to its junction with the North-South railway at or about Newcastle Waters, thence south of east to Camooweal”—

Debate resumed.

Mr. Josiah Francis moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for Thursday, 3rd November next.

7. **NAVIGATION ACT—REPEAL OF COASTAL TRADE SECTIONS.**—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the following motion of Mr. Seabrook:—That, in the opinion of this House and in the best interests of Australia, the time has arrived for the repeal of all sections of the Navigation Act relating to the coastal trade—

Mr. Perkins moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for Thursday, 24th November next.

10. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister) moved, That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at twenty-four minutes to eleven o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at eleven o'clock a.m.
