- 3. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-NINTH ASSEMBLY OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS.-Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister). by leave, made a Ministerial Statement announcing the personnel of the Australian Delegation to the Ninth Assembly of the League of Nations.
- 4. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-APPOINTMENT OF ROYAL COMMISSION-ALLEGED MONETARY OFFERS TO MEMBERS.—Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement announcing that the Government had appointed Judge Edward Scholes to act as a Royal Commissioner to inquire into certain statements made through the press to the effect that monetary offers had been made to certain Members of the House of Representatives to induce them to resign their seats in the House, and also announcing the terms of reference to the Commission.
- 5. CONCILIATION AND ARBITRATION BILL (No. 2) (1927).—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time-Debate resumed.
