- 1. The House met, at ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Norman J. O. Makin) took the Chair, and offered Prayers.
- 2. Paper.—The following Paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General—Dried Fruits Industry—Report by the Honorable J. A. Gunn (Director of Development) on Stabilization Scheme for Currants and Sultanas submitted by the Australian Dried Fruits Association.

Ordered to lie on the Table, and to be printed.

- 3. ALTERATION OF DAY OF NEXT MEETING.—Mr. Scullin (Prime Minister) moved, That the House, at its rising, adjourn until Monday next at three o'clock p.m. Question—put and passed.
- 4. Supply [Budget Debate].—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

(In the Committee.)

General debate resumed on the question (see page 294), That the first item in the Estimates for Additions, New Works, Buildings, &c., under Division I.—The Department of Defence—namely—Naval establishments—Machinery and plant, £1,500,

be agreed to, and on the Amendment moved thereto by Mr. Latham, That the first item be reduced by £1.

Want of Quorum—Member directed to return to Chamber.—Mr. Lewis having called the attention of the Chairman to the fact that a quorum of Members was not present, and the honorable Member for Richmond (Mr. Roland Green) having left the Chamber while the Bells were ringing—The Chairman, in accordance with the provisions of Standing Order No. 34, instructed the Serjeant-at-Arms to direct the honorable Member to return to the Chamber, and the honorable Member returned to the Chamber, as directed.

A quorum having been formed—

Debate continued.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. McGrath reported accordingly.

Resolved—That the House will, at the next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

5. Ways and Means [Customs Tariff Amendment (No. 6)].—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Fenton (Minister for Trade and Customs) moved-

That the Schedule to the Customs Tariff 1921–1930 as proposed to be amended by Tariff Proposals be further amended as hereunder set out, and that on and after the twenty-sixth day of July, One thousand nine hundred and thirty, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, reckoned according to standard time in the Territory for the Seat of Government, Duties of Customs be collected in pursuance of the Customs Tariff as so amended.

That in this Resolution "Tariff Proposals" means the Customs Tariff Proposals introduced into the House of Representatives on the following dates, namely:—

19th June, 1930; and 9th July, 1930.

That, excepting by mutual agreement or until after six months' notice has been given to the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand, nothing in this Resolution shall affect any goods the produce or manufacture of the Dominion of New Zealand entering the Commonwealth of Australia from the Dominion of New Zealand.
