DEATH OF SIR NEVILLE HOWSE.—Mr. Fenton (Acting Prime Minister) moved, by leave, That this House expresses its deep regret at the death of the late Major-General the Honorable Sir Neville Reginald Howse, V.C., K.C.B., K.C.M.G., F.R.C.S., a former Member of the House of Representatives and Minister of the Crown, places on record its appreciation of his distinguished public service, and tenders its profound sympathy to his widow and family in their bereavement.
And Mr. Latham (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr. Earle Page and Mr. Gibbons having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen in silence—

3. DEATH OF SIR JAMES McCAY.—Mr. Fenton (Acting Prime Minister) moved, by leave, That this House expresses its deep regret at the death of the late Lieutenant-General the Honorable Sir James Whiteside McCay, K.C.M.G., K.B.E., C.B., M.A., LL.M., V.D., a former Member of the House of Representatives and Minister of the Crown, places on record its appreciation of his distinguished public service, and tenders its profound sympathy to the members of his family in their bereavement.
And Mr. Latham (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr. Earle Page having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen in silence—
