- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable G. H. Mackay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

- 3. High Commissioner Bill (1932).—Mr. Lyons (Prime Minister) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the High Commissioner Act 1909. Question—put and passed.
- 4. Jury Exemption Bill (1932).—Mr. Latham (Attorney-General) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the Jury Exemption Act 1905-1922. Question—put and passed.

- 11. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—PRIMAGE DUTIES AND IMPORT PROHIBITIONS.—Mr. Perkins (Assistant Minister for Trade and Customs), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement announcing the intentions of the Government in regard to alterations to Primage Duties and Import Prohibitions.
- 12. Papers.—The following Papers were presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General— Imports—Statement showing classes of goods in respect of which prohibition of importation has been repealed.

Primage Duty-

Proclamation, dated 1st September, 1932, showing goods exempted from payment of primage duty on entry for home consumption.

Statement showing particulars of goods covered by the various Tariff Items mentioned in the Proclamation.

13. Ways and Means [Customs Tariff Amendment (No. 6), and Special Customs Duty (No. 3)].—

Mr. Perkins (Assistant Minister for Trade and Customs) moved-

(Customs Tariff Amendment No. 6.)

(1) That the Schedule to the Customs Tariff 1921–1930 as proposed to be amended by Tariff Proposals be further amended as hereunder set out, and that on and after the second day of September, One thousand nine hundred and thirty-two, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, reckoned according to standard time in the Territory for the Seat of Government, Duties of Customs be collected in pursuance of the Customs Tariff as so amended.

That in this Resolution "Tariff Proposals" means the Customs Tariff Proposals introduced into the House of Representatives on the following dates, namely:—

3rd May, 1932; and 24th May, 1932.

That, excepting by mutual agreement or until after six months' notice has been given to the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand, nothing in this Resolution shall affect any goods the produce or manufacture of the Dominion of New Zealand entering the Commonwealth of Australia from the Dominion of New Zealand.

#### (SPECIAL CUSTOMS DUTY No. 3.)
