10. Message from the Governor-General .-- Wheat Growers Relief Bill (1935) .-- The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:

Governor-General.

Message No. 18.

In accordance with the requirements of section 56 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to amend the Wheat Growers Relief Act (No. 2) 1934.

22nd March, 1935.

Ordered-That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House,

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Earle Page (Acting Prime Minister) moved, That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to amend the Wheat Growers Relief Act (No. 2) 1934. Question—put and passed. Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly. Mr. Earle Page moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended, to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay. Question—put and passed.

The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Earle Page, was adopted by the House.

Ordered—That Mr. Earle Page and Mr. Casey do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Earle Page then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Earle Page moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Albert Green moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed. Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

11. INVALID AND OLD-AGE PENSIONS BILL (1935).—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time-Debate resumed.

Closure.—Mr. Casey (Acting Treasurer) moved, That the question be now put.

Question—That the question be now put—put and passed.

And the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—was put accordingly, and passed.— Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.
