11. REFERENDUM, INITIATIVE AND RECALL.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the following motion of Mr. W. Maloney:-

(1) That, in view of the following facts, namely-

- (a) that the people of Australia are overtaxed without their permission by vote;
- (b) that the estimated wealth of Australia, public and private, is £5,000,000,000 as compared with Australia when owned by the aboriginals;
- (c) that the people are born, live for a time, and die, without being directly benefited by such wealth;
- (d) that the time has arrived when, to prevent Fascism and similar evils, the people should have the power of control over the Government,
- it is the opinion of this House that the Referendum, Initiative and Recall should be included in the Commonwealth Constitution, and in so far as it is necessary to give to the people full powers to initiate legislation the Constitution should be amended.
- (2) That, contingent upon the passing of such motion, it be an instruction to the Government of the day to bring in a Bill and take such further action as is necessary to carry into effect this resolution-
