DEATH OF THE HONORABLE WILLIAM WEBSTER .- Mr. Lyons (Prime Minister) moved, by leave, That this House expresses its profound regret at the death of the Honorable William Webster, a former Member of the New South Wales and Commonwealth Parliaments, and Commonwealth Minister of State, places on record its appreciation of his distinguished public service, and tenders to his widow
 - and family its deep sympathy in their bereavement. And Mr. Curtin (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr. Hughes having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—
 - Question --passed. Resolved --That Mr. Speaker be requested to transmit to the widow of the late Mr. Webster the foregoing Resolution, together with a copy of the speeches delivered thereon.
- 3. ALTERATION OF HOUR OF NEXT MEETING .- Mr. Lyons (Prime Minister) moved, That the House, at its rising, adjourn until half-past ten o'clock a.m. to-morrow. Question-put and passed.

- 5. THE LATE HONORABLE THOMAS GLASSEY.—Mr. Speaker informed the House that he had received from Mr. S. A. Glassey, son of the late Honorable Thomas Glassey, a letter thanking the House for its Resolution of sympathy.
- 6. CONSTITUTION ALTERATION (MARKETING) BILL .-- Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General) moved, pursuant to notice. That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to alter the Constitution with respect to marketing.
 - Question --put and passed.

Mr. Menzies then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question -put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Menzies moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Curtin (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

- Question-That the debate be now adjourned-put and passed.
- Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for Wednesday, the 21st instant.
- 7. REFERENDUM (CONSTITUTION ALTERATION) BILL (1936) .--- Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the Referendum

(Constitution Atteration) Act 1906-1928. Question—put and passed. Mr. Menzies then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time. Ordered—That the second reading be-made an Order-of the Day for the next sitting. F.4800/34.

8. SUPPLY [BUDGET DEBATE].-The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Supply. e ... (In the Committee.) General debate resumed on the question, That the first item in the Estimates, under Division I .---The Senate---namely-Salaries and allowances £7,900 . . be agreed to. Mr. A. G. Cameron addressing the Committee and not having concluded his speech at the termination of the time allowed by Standing Order No. 257B-Ordered-That the honorable Member have leave to continue his speech. Debate continued. Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again. The House resumed ; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly. Resolved-That the House will, at the next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee. 9.
