# FRIDAY, 10TH SEPTEMBER, 1937.

- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable G. J. Bell) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—INFANTILE PARALYSIS.—Mr. Hughes (Minister for Health), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with regard to the action taken by the Department of Health to combat Infantile Paralysis.
- 3. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-AERO CLUBS .-- Sir Archdale Parkhill (Minister for Defence), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the assistance given to Aero Clubs by the Commonwealth Government.
- 4. Printing Committee Second Report .-- Mr. Jennings brought up the Second Report from the Printing Committee (sitting in conference with the Printing Committee of the Senate). The Report was read by the Clerk, as follows:—-

- REPATRIATION FUND (BAILLIEU GIFT) BILL.—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Menzies (Attorney-General) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.
   Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Prowse reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Menzies, the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

10. NATIONAL OIL PROPRIETARY LIMITED AGREEMENT BILL.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed.

Point of Order.—A Point of Order having been raised by Mr. Lyons that certain words used by the honorable Member for East Sydney (Mr. Ward) were untrue and offensive and should be withdrawn—

Speaker's Ruling.—Mr. Speaker ruled that a statement was not unparliamentary because it was incorrect, and, as the words used contained no unparliamentary expression, he could not therefore ask for them to be withdrawn.
