## THURSDAY, 29TH SEPTEMBER, 1938.

- 1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable G. J. Bell) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

International Situation-Ministerial Statement.-Mr. Lyons (Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement informing the House of further proposals which had been made by the Prime Minister of Great Britain for a peaceful settlement of the Sudeten German problem in Czechoslovakia, and of Mr. Chamberlain's acceptance of the invitation of Herr Hitler to a Conference to be held at Munich to-day. Mr. Lyons also informed the House of certain suggestions made by the Commonwealth Government to the British Government, and expressed the appreciation of honorable Members of the services of Mr. Chamberlain.

Mr. Curtin (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a statement on the matter.
