- (ii) have been transhipped and the intended destination of which, when originally shipped from Newfoundland, the Collector of Customs is satisfied was Australia.
- (2.) That the duties of Customs imposed on any goods in accordance with this Resolution be in lieu of the duties (if any) imposed on those goods under the Customs Tariff.
- (3.) That the duties of Customs imposed by this Resolution be charged, collected and paid to the use of the King for the purposes of the Commonwealth of Australia on all goods subject to those duties which are imported into Australia after the commencement of the Act passed to give effect to this Resolution, or are imported into Australia before, and are not entered for home consumption until after, the commencement of that Act.

(4.) That, in this Resolution, unless the contrary intention appears-

British Preferential Tariff "means the rates of duty set out in the column headed British Preferential Tariff" in the Schedule to the Customs Tariff, in respect

of any goods in relation to which the expression is used; "Customs Tariff" means the Customs Tariff 1933-1939 and includes that Act as amended from time to time and any Act passed in substitution for that Act,

or for that Act as so amended; "Proclamation" means a Proclamation by the Governor-General, or by the person for the time being administering the government of the Commonwealth, acting with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, and published in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette.
