- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.- Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. S. Rosevear) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE-REPORT.--Mr. James (Chairman) brought up the following Report from the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works :-

Report relating to the proposed erection of a Hostel at Canberra, Australian Capital Territory.

3. REFERENDUM-VOTING BY MEMBERS OF THE FORCES-MINISTERIAL STATEMENT .-- Mr. Forde (Minister for the Army), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the arrangements made to enable members of the fighting services in the South-West Pacific area and other places to record their votes at the forthcoming referendum.

4. PAPERS.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute--Lands Acquisition Act—Land acquired for Commonwealth purposes--Coniston, New South Wales.

National Security Act-

National Security (General) Regulations---Order-Press and broadcasting censorship.

National Security (Man Power) Regulations-Order-Control of pharmaceutical chemists.

Ordered-That Mr. Harrison be granted extensions of time (2).

Ordered-That Mr. Evatt (Minister for External Affairs) be granted extensions of time (2).

Debate continued.

Mr. Morgan moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question-That the debate be now adjourned-put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

- 6. TIME OF NEXT MEETING.- Mr. Curtin (Prime Minister) moved, That the House, at its rising, adjourn until to-morrow at half-past ten o'clock a.m. Question—put and passed.
- 7. ADJOURNMENT. Mr. Curtin (Prime Minister) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Ordered---That Mr. Holt be granted an extension of time. Debate continued. Question---put and passed.

And then the House, at twenty minutes past cleven o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at half-past ten o'clock a.m.
