The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Chifley was adopted by the House. 6. WAYS AND MEANS--ESTIMATES 1944-45.-The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Wavs and Means.

#### (In the Committee.)

Mr. Chifley (Treasurer) moved, That, towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty, for the service of the year 1944-45, there be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund a sum not exceeding £130,904,000.

Question put and passed.

Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Riordan reported accordingly.

Resolved That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee. The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Chifley, was adopted by the House.

Ordered That Mr. Chifley and Mr. Lazzarini do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

7. APPROPRIATION BILL 1944-45. Mr. Chifley (Treasurer) then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund a sum for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and forty-five and to appropriate the Supplies granted by the Parliament for that year ", and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question put and passed.—Bill read a first time. Mr. Chifley moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question -put and passed .- Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

#### (In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed : Mr. Riordan reported accordingly. On the motion of Mr. Chiffey, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time.
