7. ADDRESS IN REPLY TO HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH.—Mr. Fraser brought up the Address in Reply to His Royal Highness's Speech, prepared by the Committee appointed at the previous sitting, and the same was read by the Clerk, as follows :—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR ROYAL HIGHNESS—

We, the House of Representatives of the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our loyalty to our Most Gracious Sovereign, to extend to Your Royal Highness a welcome to Australia, and to thank Your Royal Highness for the Speech which you have been pleased to address to Parliament.

Mr. Fraser moved, That the Address be agreed to.

Mr. Burke seconded the motion.

Debate ensued.

Ordered—That Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) be granted an extension of time.

Ordered—That Mr. Evatt (Minister for External Affairs) be granted an extension of time.

Debate continued.

Mr. Curtin (Prime Minister) was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed.

Ordered—That the debate be now adjourned, and that the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

8. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Curtin (Prime Minister) moved, That the House do now adjourn.

Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at four minutes to ten o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at half-past ten o'clock a.m.
