- (b) all moneys appropriated by the Parliament for the purposes of the Commission.
- "(2.) The Commission shall, out of the moneys standing to the credit of the account-
  - (a) defray all costs, charges and expenses incurred by the Commission in the performance of its duties and the exercise of its powers, authorities and functions under this Act; and
  - (b) pay the remuneration and allowances of the members of the Commission and the salaries, wages and allowances of persons appointed or employed by the Commission.".

Mr. Lazza ini moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Menzi:s (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question-That the debate be now adjourned-put and passed.

Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

18. WOOL (CONTRIBUTORY CHARGE) ASSESSMENT BILL 1945. - Mr. Forde (Minister for the Army) moved, by leave, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act relating to the Imposition, Assessment and Collection of a Contributory Charge upon certain Wool produced in Australia, and for other purposes.

Question--put and passed. Mr. Forde then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Forde moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate er sued.

Question--put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.).

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Riordan reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Forde, the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

19. WAYS AND MEANS-WOOL (CONTRIBUTORY CHARGE).-The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Forde (Minister for the Army) moved-

- 1. That a contributory charge be imposed on all wool-
  - (a) produced in Australia; and
  - (b) on or after a date to be fixed by proclamation-

(i) sold by a broker at auction or otherwise;

(ii) purchased by a manufacturer;

(iii) subjected by a manufacturer (whether or not he is the producer or owner of the wool) to a process of manufacture; or

(iv) exported from Australia.

- 2. That the rate of the charge be such percentage as is prescribed by regulations under the Act to give effect to this Resolution, being a percentage which, in the opinion of the Governor-General, after taking into consideration any advice tendered to the Minister by the Australian Wool Realization Commission, is necessary in order to provide the following amounts:-
  - (a) The amounts required to meet the share of the industry in the operating expenses of the Joint Organization as provided in paragraph three of Part III. of the Disposals
  - (b) The amounts required for payment of interest, at such rate as the Treasurer determines, upon the amount from time to time expended by the Commonwealth in purchases of wool in pursuance of the Disposals Plan and unrecouped; and
  - (c) The amounts required for payment into the Wool Use Promotion Fund in pursuance of section sixteen of the Wool Use Promotion Act 1945, as proposed to be affected by the Wool (Contributory Charge) Assessment Bill 1945.
- 3. That in this Resolution, "the Disposals Plan" mean the plan a copy of which is set forth in the Schedule to the Wool Realization Bill 1945.

Motion agreed to.

Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Riordan reported accordingly.

Resolved-That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee. Mr. Forde moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent the remaining stages being passed without delay. Question—put and passed.

The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Forde, was adopted by the House.

Ordered-That Mr. Forde and Mr. Chifley do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

20. Wool (Contributory Charge) Bill 1945.-Mr. Forde (Minister for the Army) then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to impose a Contributory Charge upon certain Wool produced in Australia", and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time. Mr. Forde moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Riordan reported accordingly. On the motion of Mr. Forde, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time.

21. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Chifley (Prime Minister) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at nineteen minutes past three o'clock in the morning, adjourned until this day at half-past ten o'clock a.m.
