- 1. The House met, at three o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. S. Rosevear) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. DISTINGUISHED VISITOR.—Mr. Speaker informed the House that Lord Glenconner, a Member of the House of Lords, was within the precincts. The distinguished visitor thereupon, with the concurrence of honorable Members, was provided with a seat on the floor of the House.
- 3. BROADCASTING COMMITTEE—NINTH AND TENTH REPORTS.—Mr. Francis, Vice-Chairman, brought up the Ninth and Tenth Reports from the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Broadcasting, and moved, That the Papers be printed. Question—put and passed.
