- 2. CONDITIONS ON JAPANESE DESTROYER "YOIZUKI"—REPORT OF INVESTIGATING MISSION—MOTION FOR PRINTING PAPER.—Mr. Chifley (Prime Minister) laid upon the Table, by command of His Royal Highness the Governor-General, the following Paper:

Question—put and passed.

Mr. Chifley then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Chifley moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.
Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the day for the next sitting.

7. COMMONWEALTH PUBLIC SERVICE BILL 1946.—Mr. Chiffey (Prime Minister) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to provide for the appointment to or employment in the Commonwealth Service of certain State Employees, and for other purposes.

Question-put and passed.

Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

11. INCOME TAX ASSESSMENT BILL 1946.—Mr. Chifley (Treasurer) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the Income Tax Assessment Act 1936-1945.

Question—put and passed.

Mr. Chifley then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed. —Bill read a first time.

Mr. Chifley moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

12. WAR-TIME (COMPANY) TAX ASSESSMENT BILL 1946.—Mr. Chifley (Treasurer) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the War-time (Company) Tax Assessment Act 1940-1944.

Question—put and passed.

Mr. Chifley then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.
Mr. Chifley moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

- 13. Postponement of Business.—Ordered—That the intervening business be postponed until after Order of the Day No. 16, Government Business.
- 14. Ways and Means-Entertainments Tax.—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Chifley (Treasurer) moved, That the tax imposed by the Entertainments Tax Act 1942-1944 continue to be imposed without the limitation on the period of its operation contained in section six of that Act.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Guy reported accordingly.

Resolved-That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee,

Mr. Ward (Minister for External Territories) moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

16. ADJOURNMENT.—Mr. Evatt (Attorney-General) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at eighteen minutes past ten o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at half-past two o'clock p.m.
