- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. S. Rosevear) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.—Mr. Chifley (Prime Minister) moved, by leave, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Notice of Motion No. 1, General Business, taking precedence of all other business until disposed of. Question—put and passed.
- 3. PRIVILEGE.—Mr. Holt, as a matter of Privilege, asked whether Mr. Speaker had arranged for the recorded broadcast of certain proceedings in the House yesterday to be played back to a limited number of people, and, if so, by what authority such action was taken, in view of the appointment by Parliament of a Joint Committee to regulate the broadcasting of Parliamentary proceedings. Mr. Speaker stated that the Chair wanted to satisfy itself on the details of a certain incident which

Mr. Speaker stated that the Chair wanted to satisfy itself on the details of a certain incident which took place in the House yesterday to ensure that no injustice had been done to an honorable Member.

4. MR. SPEAKER-WANT OF CONFIDENCE MOTION.-Mr. Menzies (Leader of the Opposition) moved, pursuant to notice, That Mr. Speaker does not possess the confidence of this House. Debate ensued.

Mr. Speaker having ruled that no reflection could be made on any Vote of the House and that reference could not be made to previous debates—

Point of Order.—Mr. Spender raised a Point of Order that, when a motion of want of confidence in Mr. Speaker was being considered, the rule with respect to referring to previous debates did not apply, and that it was in order to refer to any event.

Speaker's Ruling.—Mr. Speaker ruled that the Standing Orders must be observed in any circumstances. Debate continued.

Closure .--- Mr. Chifley (Prime Minister) moved, That the question be now put.

Mr. Harrison seeking to raise a Point of Order-

Speaker's Ruling.-Mr. Speaker ruled that no Point of Order could be taken on the Closure at this stage.

- *Privilege.*—Mr. Harrison raised a question of Privilege in that, as seconder of the motion, he had been given leave to reserve his remarks, and asked whether the Closure could be moved before he had made his speech.
- Speaker's Ruling.—Mr. Speaker ruled that the motion for the Closure was in order and pointed out that the House was about to decide whether the honorable Member would have an opportunity to make his speech.

Question-That the question be now put-put.

- 5. BROADCASTING OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS-STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER .--- Mr. Speaker informed the House that, as Chairman of the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings, he had inquired of the New Zealand Government whether the question had ever been raised of providing means of reply to a member of the public attacked in Parliamentary proceedings, and had been informed that no special provision existed and that such a situation had not arisen. Mr. Speaker also informed the House that the Joint Committee had considered the matter
  - and had decided that no action should be taken at this stage but that the matter be deferred for consideration by the Committee to be appointed by the next Parliament.

7. ALLENS DEFORTATION BILL 1946 .- The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading -Mr. Calwell (Minister for Immigration) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Holt moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

9. WAYS AND MEANS-INCOME TAX.-The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

Mr. Fadden moved, That paragraph 1 be postponed.

Debate continued.

The House resumed ; Mr. Barnard reported accordingly. Resolved-That the House will, at the next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

10. ADJOURNMENT.---Mr. Drakeford (Minister for Civil Aviation) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.
