- 2. Printing Committee—Second Report.—Mr. Daly, Chairman, brought up the Second Report from the Printing Committee (sitting in conference with the Printing Committee of the Senate).

 The Report was read by the Clerk, as follows:—

REPORT.

The Printing Committee have the honour to report that they have met in Conference with the Printing Committee of the Senate.

The Joint Committee, having considered the Petitions and Papers presented to Parliament since the last meeting of the Committee, recommend that the following be printed:—

Commonwealth Public Works Committee Act—Twentieth General Report of the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works.

Northern Territory—Report on Administration for year 1945–46.

Representation Act—Certificate of the Chief Electoral Officer of the Numbers of the People of the Commonwealth and of the several States as at 30th June, 1947.

Representation Act—Determination, made by the Chief Electoral Officer, of the Representation of the States in the House of Representatives, dated 17th November, 1947.

In connexion with the Twenty-first Annual Report of the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research, ordered to be printed by both Houses on the 21st November, 1947, the Committee recommends that, owing to printing difficulties, certain photographs contained in the original copy be excluded in printing the Report as a Parliamentary Paper.

Mr. Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise

in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly-
