 - 2. ALTERATION OF DAY OF NEXT MEETING.—Mr. Harrison (Vice-President of the Executive Council) moved, That the House, at its rising, adjourn until to-morrow at half-past ten o'clock a.m. Question—put and passed.
 - 3. TINPLATE—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT.—Mr. Beale (Minister for Supply), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the allocation of timplate in Australia.
 - 4. Loss of Airliner Amana—Reports of Air Court of Inquiry—Ministerial Statement—Motion for Printing Papers.—Mr. Anthony (Minister for Civil Aviation), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement regarding the reports of the Air Court of Inquiry on the accident involving the loss of the airliner Amana near York, Western Australia, on the 26th June, 1950. Mr. Anthony then, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, laid upon the Table the following Papers:—

Debate resumed by Mr. Calwell, who moved, as an amendment, That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof:—"the Bill be referred to a Select Committee of this House appointed to inquire into and report as a matter of urgency upon the proposed imposition of these heavy increases in charges at a time when revenue from other sources is at a record high level".

Debate continued.

Mr. Cremean moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

16. Adjournment.—Mr. Beale (Minister for Supply) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.
