In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Administrator of the Government of the Commonwealth recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to amend the Defence Forces Retirement Benefits Act 1948-1950, and for other purposes.

"'(la.) Where a pensioner—

(a) again becomes a member for the purposes of this Act; or

(b) serves on full-time continuous service in the Service and receives pay in respect of that full-time service,

so much of the pension as is equivalent to the amount payable by the Commonwealth under section thirty-two of this Act shall be cancelled during the period of that full-time continuous service in excess of twenty-eight working days in any period of twelve months.'; and ".

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

Bill to be reported with an amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Adermann reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. McBride, by leave, the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.
