6. MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE.—INCOME TAX AND SOCIAL SERVICES CONTRIBUTION ASSESSMENT BILL (No. 3) 1952.—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate :—

MR. SPEAKER,

Message No. 166.

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for "An Act to amend the 'Income Tax and Social Services Contribution Assessment Act 1936-1951', as amended by the 'Income Tax and Social Services Contribution Assessment Act 1952' and by the 'Income Tax and Social Services Contribution Assessment Act (No. 2) 1952', and for other purposes", and acquaints the House that the Senate has agreed to the Bill with the Amendment indicated by the annexed Schedule, in which Amendment the Senate requests the concurrence of the House of Representatives.

Ordered—That the Amendment be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

The Committee proceeded to consider the Amendment, which is as follows :—

SCHEDULE OF THE AMENDMENT MADE BY THE SENATE.

Page 7, clause 7, at end of clause add the following sub-clause :—

"(4.) Where—

(a) a change in the ownership of, or in the interests of persons in, property, being a change in relation to which the section inserted in the Principal Act by this section applies, occurred on or after—

(i) the first day of July, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-one; or

(ii) if the person or persons who owned the property before the change adopted an accounting period in lieu of the year of income that commenced on that date—the first day of that accounting period, or the fifth day of November, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-one, whichever is the earlier,

and not later than the eighteenth day of September, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-two; and

(b) the Commissioner is satisfied that the property became, upon the change, an asset of a business carried on by a *bona fide* partnership of the persons by whom the property was owned after the change,

sub-section (2.) of the first-mentioned section applies in relation to that change as if the reference in paragraph (b) of that sub-section to one-quarter of the value of the property were a reference to such smaller proportion of that value as the Commissioner considers reasonable having regard to the number of partners and the circumstances in which the change occurred."

Sir Arthur Fadden (Treasurer) moved, That the Amendment be agreed to.

Mr. Evatt (Leader of the Opposition) moved, as an amendment to the Senate's Amendment, That the following proviso be added :—

"Provided that the section inserted in the Principal Act by this section shall not be construed or applied so as to increase the amount of tax that was paid or payable in respect of income of the years of income which commenced on the first day of July, One thousand nine hundred and fifty, and on the first day of July, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-one, and in the further period ended the eighteenth day of September, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-two, except insofar as may be necessary to give effect to the notice of agreement given under sub-section (2.) of the section inserted in the Principal Act by this section."
