- 1. The House met, at ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable A. G. Cameron) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Petition.—Mr. Ward presented a petition from certain Australian citizens praying that this House will consider the continued unrestricted importation of recorded overseas radio programmes and take action to protect the Australian interests which are endangered thereby. Petition received and read.
- 3. Fanning Island Cable Station—Illness of Officer—Assistance given by United States—Ministerial Statement.—Mr. Anthony (Postmaster-General), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement regarding an officer at the Australian Overseas Telecommunications cable station at Fanning Island whose serious illness demanded early treatment with cortisone. Mr. Anthony informed the House that, on request, the United States Ambassador to Australia had made arrangements for supplies of cortisone to be flown by special aircraft from Honolulu and that the aircraft had now arrived at Fanning Island. Mr. Anthony then expressed the appreciation of the Government, the Parliament and the Australian people to the United States of America for the invaluable assistance given.

Mr. Evatt (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a Statement associating the Opposition with the expression of gratitude.
