9. INCOME TAX (INTERNATIONAL AGREEMENTS) BILL 1958.—Sir Arthur Fadden (Treasurer) moved, by leave, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the *Income Tax* (*International Agreements*) Act 1953.

Question-put and passed.

11. Message from the Governor-General—Wheat Acquisition (Undistributed Moneys) Bill 1958.—
Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General:—

W. J. SLIM,

Governor-General.

Message No. 6.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to provide for the application for the purposes of Wheat Research of certain Moneys held by the Australian Wheat Board.

Canberra, 19th April, 1958.

Ordered—That the Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith. Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Osborne (Minister for Air) moved, That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to provide for the application for the purposes of Wheat Research of certain Moneys held by the Australian Wheat Board.

Question—put and passed.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Lawrence reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Osborne, the Resolution reported from the Committee was adopted by the House,

12 WHEAT ACQUISITION (UNDISTRIBUTED MONEYS) BILL 1958.—The Order of the Day having been read for the further consideration of this Bill in Committee of the whole House-Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House again resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Clauses 1 to 3, by leave, taken together, and agreed to. Clause 4 debated and agreed to.

Remainder of Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Lawrence reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Osborne (Minister for Air), the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

13. Broadcasting and Television Bill 1958.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time-Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to, after debate. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Adermann reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Davidson (Postmaster-General), the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

14. ADJOURNMENT.-Mr. Davidson (Postmaster-General) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.
