TUESDAY, 23RD SEPTEMBER, 1958.

1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
2. PETITIONS.—Mr. Pearce presented a Petition from certain members of the Pensioners' League of Queensland praying that the Parliament will give immediate consideration to the question of increasing pensions to no less than 50 per cent. of the basic wage as the minimum.  
Mr. Barnard presented a Petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the Government will make provision, by means of a Referendum, for the alteration of certain sections of the Constitution which relate to the aboriginal people of Australia.  
Petitions severally received and read.

4. MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL—STATES GRANTS BILL 1958.—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General:—

W. J. SLIM,  
*Governor-General.*

*Message No. 36.*

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to grant Financial Assistance to the States of South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania.

Ordered—That the Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith.  
Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Menzies (Acting Treasurer) moved, That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to grant Financial Assistance to the States of South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania.

Ordered—That Mr. Menzies and Mr. H. E. Holt do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Menzies then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Menzies moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Calwell), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

5. POSTPONEMENT OF GOVERNMENT BUSINESS.—Ordered—That Government Business be postponed until after Notices of Motion Nos. 1 and 2, General Business.
6. NORTHERN TERRITORY REPRESENTATION BILL 1958.—Mr. Calwell moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to remove the Disabilities imposed on the Member of the House of Representatives representing the Northern Territory.  
Question—put and passed.  
Mr. Calwell then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.  
Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.  
Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
7. AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY REPRESENTATION BILL 1958.—Mr. Calwell moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to remove the Disabilities imposed on the Member of the House of Representatives representing the Australian Capital Territory.  
Question—put and passed.  
Mr. Calwell then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.  
Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.  
Ordered—That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
8. EXCISE BILL 1958.—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Osborne (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.  
Debate adjourned (Mr. Calwell), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
9. COAL INDUSTRY BILL 1958.—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Townley (Minister representing the Minister for National Development) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.  
Debate adjourned (Mr. Calwell), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
10. NATIONAL HEALTH BILL 1958.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—  
Debate resumed.  
Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.  
Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

*(In the Committee.)*

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and debated.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Adermann reported accordingly.
