- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. PETITIONS.—Mr. J. R. Fraser presented a Petition from certain citizens of the Australian Capital Territory praying that the Government will take immediate action to defer the implementation of rental increases of Government-owned dwellings in Canberra and conduct an inquiry into Canberra rentals at which evidence may be taken both from individuals and from community organizations. Petition received and read.

Mr. Fraser also presented a similar Petition, from certain residents of the Currong Flats in the Australian Capital Territory, which was received.

- PAPERS.—The following Papers were presented, pursuant to Statute— Norfolk Island Act—Ordinance—1961—No. 1—Customs. Public Service Act—Appointment—Postmaster-General's Department—R. P. Slattery.
- 4. SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS—NOTICE OF MOTION, GENERAL BUSINESS.—Mr. Downer (Minister for Immigration) moved, by leave, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent consideration of Notice of Motion No. 1, General Business, being continued until 12.45 p.m. Question—put and passed.
- 5. CONSTITUTIONAL REVIEW.—Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition) moved, pursuant to notice, That this House is of opinion that the recommendations of the Joint Committee on Constitutional Review, which was established in 1956 and which reported to both Houses in 1958 and 1959, should be submitted to the people for their approval. Debate ensued.

The time allotted for precedence to General Business having expired, the debate was interrupted, Mr. Failes was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed, and the resumption of debate was made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

- 6. EXPORT PAYMENTS INSURANCE CORPORATION BILL 1961.—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. McEwen (Minister for Trade) moved, That the Bill be now read a second time. Debate adjourned (Mr. Pollard), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
- 7. DEFENCE FORCES RETIREMENT BENEFITS BILL 1961.—Mr. Holt (Treasurer) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the *Defence Forces Retirement Benefits Act* 1959.
 - Question—put and passed.

Bill brought up, and read a first time.

Mr. Holt moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.
