1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable J. McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
2. PETITION.—Mr. J. R. Fraser presented a Petition from certain citizens of the Australian Capital Territory praying that the Government will take immediate action to defer the rental increases on Government-owned dwellings in Canberra and immediately promote an inquiry into rentals in relation to costs of living in Canberra and the need for the establishment of a Canberra Basic Wage.  
Petition received.
3. PAPERS.—The following Paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Commonwealth—  
Tariff Board—Report of Deputy Chairman—Poultry.

4. DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF URGENCY—BORROWINGS FROM THE INTERNATIONAL MONETARY FUND.—Mr. Speaker informed the House that Mr. Ward had proposed that a definite matter of urgent public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The sacrifice of Australian sovereignty constituted by the undertakings given by the Government to the International Monetary Fund in negotiating the recent loan from that body".  
The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—  
Mr. Ward addressed the House.  
Discussion ensued.  
Discussion concluded.
5. TIMBER INDUSTRY—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT.—Mr. McEwen (Minister for Trade), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to an answer which he had given earlier this day to a question without notice regarding the timber industry.
6. GENERAL BUSINESS.—It being past fifteen minutes to one o'clock p.m., General Business was not called on.
7. LIFE INSURANCE BILL 1961.—Mr. Holt (Treasurer) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act relating to Life Insurance.

Bill brought up, and read a first time.  
Mr. Holt moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.  
Debate adjourned (Mr. Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
8. AUDIT BILL 1961.—Mr. Holt (Treasurer), pursuant to leave given on the 10th May, brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to amend the 'Audit Act 1901–1960'".  
Bill read a first time.  
Mr. Holt moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time.  
Debate adjourned (Mr. Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

Question—put and passed.
