7. DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF URGENCY—SOCIAL SERVICES.—Mr. Speaker informed the House that Mr. A. D. Fraser had proposed that a definite matter of urgent public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "Restrictions being suffered by those on social services, notably new restrictions on pensioners in letting rooms in their homes, the increasingly severe restriction on pensioner medical entitlement and the exclusion of unemployed persons from such entitlement, the exclusion of all mental hospital patients from any pension payment, the undue restrictions which have become apparent in the operation of the supplementary allowance and other similar restrictions".
