14. Message from the Governor-General—Defence Forces Retirement Benefits Bill 1962.—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General:—

DE L'ISLE,

Governor-General.

Message No. 43.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act relating to Retirement Benefits for Members of the Defence Forces of the Commonwealth.

Canberra, 21st August, 1962.

Ordered—That the Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House, forthwith.

(In the Committee.)

Mr. Freeth (Minister for the Interior) moved, That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act relating to Retirement Benefits for Members of the Defence Forces of the Commonwealth.

Question—put and passed. Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Drury reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Freeth, the Resolution reported from the Committee was adopted by the House.

15. Defence Forces Retirement Benefits Bill 1962.—The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the further consideration of the Bill.

(In the Committee.)

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole.

On the motion of Mr. Freeth (Minister for the Interior), by leave, the following amendments were made together:—

Clause 13, page 5, omit from proposed First Schedule "1 4 10" (wherever occurring), insert "1 4 11".

Clause 13, page 6, omit from proposed Second Schedule "1 6 6", insert "1 6 3".

Clause 17, page 15, lines 40 to 42, omit from paragraph (a) of sub-section (4.) of proposed section fifty A "as from the pay-day next following the commencement of this section", insert "as from the date of the election (or, if that date is not a pay-day, as from the next following pay-day)".

Clause 17, page 16, lines 1 and 2, omit from paragraph (b) of sub-section (4.) of proposed section fifty A "as from the date of commencement of this section", insert "as from the date of the election".

Bill, as amended, agreed to, after debate.

Bill to be reported with amendments.

The House resumed; Mr. Drury reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Freeth, by leave, the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

16. STATES GRANTS (SPECIAL ASSISTANCE) BILL 1962.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr. Coutts), and the resumption of the debate made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

17. Adjournment.—Mr. Freeth (Minister for the Interior) moved, That the House do now adjourn. Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at seven minutes to eleven o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at half-past two o'clock p.m.
