## WEDNESDAY, 6TH MAY, 1964.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Sir John McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. QUESTIONS.—Questions without notice were asked.
- 3. PAPER.—The following paper was presented, pursuant to statute— Life Insurance Act—Eighteenth Annual Report of the Insurance Commissioner, for 1963.
- 4. CYPRUS—UNITED NATIONS POLICE FORCE—AUSTRALIAN PARTICIPATION—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT.— Mr. Hasluck (Minister for External Affairs), by leave, made a ministerial statement with reference to Australia's participation in the formation of a United Nations Police Force for service in Cyprus.
- ANSETT COMPANIES—ALLEGATIONS OF TAX CONCESSIONS—STATEMENT BY MEMBER.—Mr. Cameron, by leave, made a statement with reference to allegations that preferential tax concessions had been granted to the Ansett group of companies.
  Mr. Holt (Transmurp) by leave also made a statement in companion with the matter.

Mr. Holt (Treasurer), by leave, also made a statement in connexion with the matter.

6. DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—SOUTH AFRICAN RACIAL POLICY.—Mr. Speaker informed the House that Mr. J. F. Cairns had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The need for the Government to use its influence with the Government of South Africa, to urge it in the name of humanity, to refrain from carrying out the death penalty upon persons who have, for many years, led a non-violent campaign against racial intolerance and suppression known as apartheid".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support— Mr. Cairns addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

- 7. AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY—PROPOSED JOINT COMMITTEE—Mr. Anthony (Minister for the Interior) moved, by leave—
  - (1) That a joint committee be appointed to-
    - (a) examine and report on all proposals for modifications or variations of the plan of lay-out of the City of Canberra and its environs published in the *Commonwealth* of Australia Gazette on the nineteenth day of November, 1925, as previously modified or varied, which are referred to the committee by the Minister for the Interior; and
    - (b) examine and report on such other matters relating to the Australian Capital Territory as may be referred to the committee by the Minister for the Interior.
  - (2) That the committee consist of two Members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Prime Minister, two Members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Leader of the Opposition in the House of Representatives, three Senators appointed by the Leader of the Government in the Senate and two Senators appointed by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate.
  - (3) That every appointment of a member of the committee be forthwith notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
  - (4) That the members of the committee shall hold office as a joint committee until the House of Representatives expires by dissolution or effluxion of time.
  - (5) That the committee elect as Chairman of the committee one of the members appointed by the Leader of the Government in the Senate.
  - (6) That the Chairman of the committee may, from time to time, appoint another member of the committee to be the Deputy Chairman of the committee, and that the member so appointed act as Chairman of the committee at any time when the Chairman is not present at a meeting of the committee.

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- (7) That the committee have power to appoint sub-committees consisting of three or more of its members and to refer to such a sub-committee any matter which the committee is empowered to examine.
- (8) That the committee have power to send for persons, papers and records and to sit during any recess or adjournment of the Parliament and during the sittings of either House of the Parliament.
- (9) That the committee have leave to report from time to time and that any member of the committee have power to add a protest or dissent to any report.
- (10) That five members of the committee, including the Chairman or Deputy Chairman, constitute a quorum of the committee, and two members of a sub-committee constitute a quorum of the sub-committee.
- (11) That in matters of procedure the Chairman or Deputy Chairman presiding at the meeting have a deliberative vote and, in the event of an equality of voting, have a casting vote, and that, in other matters, the Chairman or Deputy Chairman have a deliberative vote only.
- (12) That the foregoing provisions of this resolution, so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders.
- (13) That a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution and requesting that it concur and take action accordingly.

Debate ensued.

Question-put and passed.

- 8. ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE, BLOCK 5, DARWIN-APPROVAL OF WORK.-Mr. Freeth (Minister representing the Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice, That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1913-1960, it is expedient that the following proposed work should be carried out without having been referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works:-Administrative Office, Block 5, Darwin, Northern Territory. Question-put and passed.
- 9. COMMONWEALTH AID ROADS BILL 1964.—The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—
  - Debate resumed.

- On the motion of Mr. Adermann, the following amendmen: was made:—Page 4, paragraph (b), after proposed sub-section (7.) add the following sub-section:—
- " (8.) In this section, " year " means a period commencing on the first day of January and ending on the following thirty-first day of December.'.".

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Title agreed to.

Bill to be reported with amendments.

- On the motion of Mr. Adermann, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.
