 - And Mr. Calwell (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr. McEwen (Minister for Trade and Industry) and Mr. J. R. Fraser having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—

Mr. A. D. Fraser moved, That the following new clause be inserted in the Bill:-

- "2A. Section one hundred of the Principal Act is amended by omitting sub-section (6.) and inserting in its stead the following sub-section:—
 - '(6.) A licensee shall not broadcast or televise an advertisement relating to-

(a) a substance or appliance for which a therapeutic use is claimed, or

(b) a substance, appliance, method or technique for which cosmetic and/or physiological advantages are claimed, unless the text of the proposed advertisement has been approved by the Director-General of Health, or, on appeal to the Minister under this section, by the Minister.'.".

Debate ensued.

Proposed new clause negatived.

Remainder of Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Failes reported accordingly.
