- 5 NORTHERN TERRITORY—LAND TENURE PROPOSALS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Barnes (Minister for Territories), by leave, made a ministerial statement with reference to proposals for the amendment of land tenure legislation in the Northern Territory.

6 SYDNEY AND MELBOURNE AIRPORTS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr Swartz (Minister for Civil Aviation), by leave, made a ministerial statement with respect to the relative progress of development of the Sydney and Melbourne airports and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

Sydney and Melbourne Airports-Ministerial statement, 7 March 1967.

Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper. Debate ensued.

Debate adjourned (Mr C. K. Jones), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 7 AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY—PROPOSED JOINT COMMITTEE: Mr Anthony (Minister for the Interior) moved, by leave—
  - (1) That a joint committee be appointed to-
    - (a) examine and report on all proposals for modifications or variations of the plan of lay-out of the City of Canberra and its environs published in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette on the nineteenth day of November 1925, as previously modified or varied, which are referred to the committee by the Minister for the Interior; and
    - (b) examine and report on such other matters relating to the Australian Capital Territory as may be referred to the committee by the Minister for the Interior.
  - (2) That the committee consist of two Members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Prime Minister, two Members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Leader of the Opposition in the House of Representatives, three Senators appointed by the Leader of the Government in the Senate and two Senators appointed by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate.
  - (3) That every appointment of a member of the committee be forthwith notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
  - (4) That the members of the committee shall hold office as a joint committee until the House of Representatives expires by dissolution or effluxion of time.
  - (5) That the committee elect as Chairman of the committee one of the members appointed by the Leader of the Government in the Senate.
  - (6) That the Chairman of the committee may, from time to time, appoint another member of the committee to be the Deputy Chairman of the committee, and that the member so appointed act as Chairman of the committee at any time when the Chairman is not present at a meeting of the committee.

- (7) That the committee have power to appoint sub-committees consisting of three or more of its members and to refer to such a sub-committee any matter which the committee is empowered to examine.
- (8) That the committee have power to send for persons, papers and records and to sit during any recess or adjournment of the Parliament and during the sittings of either House of the Parliament.
- (9) That the committee have leave to report from time to time and that any member of the committee have power to add a protest or dissent to any report.
- (10) That five members of the committee, including the Chairman or Deputy Chairman, constitute a quorum of the committee, and two members of a sub-committee constitute a quorum of the sub-committee.
- (11) That in matters of procedure the Chairman or Deputy Chairman presiding at the meeting have a deliberative vote and, in the event of an equality of voting, have a casting vote, and that, in other matters, the Chairman or Deputy Chairman have a deliberative vote only.
- (12) That the foregoing provisions of this resolution, so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders.
- (13) That a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution and requesting that it concur and take action accordingly.

Debate ensued.

Question-put and passed.

8 COMMITTEE OF PRIVILEGES: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—That Mr Clark, Mr Crean, Mr Drury, Mr J. R. Fraser, Mr James, Mr Killen, Mr Peacock, Mr St. John and Mr Turnbull be members of the Committee of Privileges; five to form a quorum.

Question-put and passed.

9 STANDING ORDERS COMMITTEE: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—That, in addition to Mr Speaker, the Chairman of Committees, the Leader of the House, and the Deputy Leader of the Opposition, ex officio members, the following Members be members of the Standing Orders Committee, five to form a quorum, viz.: the Prime Minister, Mr Bryant, Mr Clark, Mr Drury, Mr Duthie, Mr Fulton and Mr McEwen.

Question-put and passed.

- 10 House Committee: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—That, in addition to Mr Speaker, ex officio, Mr Failes, Mr J. R. Fraser, Mr Graham, Mr Hansen, Mr C. K. Jones and Mr Stokes be members of the House Committee.

  Ouestion—put and passed.
- 11 LIBRARY COMMITTEE: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—That, in addition to Mr Speaker, ex officio, Mr Allan, Mr Bryant, Mr Cross, Mr O'Connor, Mr Turner and Mr Wentworth be members of the Library Committee.

Question—put and passed.

12 PRINTING COMMITTEE: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—That Miss Brownbill, Mr Bryant, Mr Corbett, Mr J. R. Fraser, Mr Graham, Mr Lynch and Mr Stewart be members of the Printing Committee.

Question -- put and passed.

13 ADDRESS IN REPLY TO THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the following Address in Reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor-General be agreed to:

14 STEVEDORING INDUSTRY CHARGE BILL 1967: Mr Bury (Minister for Labour and National Service) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Stevedoring Industry Charge Act 1947-1966.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Bury moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr C. K. Jones), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

15 Address in Reply to the Governor-General's Speech: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the following Address in Reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor-General be agreed to:
