## THURSDAY, 6 APRIL 1967

- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 3 KENNEDY ROUND OF TRADE NEGOTIATIONS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr McEwen (Minister for Trade and Industry), by leave, made a ministerial statement with reference to the Kennedy Round of trade negotiations now drawing to a close in Geneva.
  - Mr J. F. Cairns, by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- 4 NATIONAL LIBRARY COUNCIL: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—
  That, in accordance with the provisions of the National Library Act 1960–1966, this
  House elects Mr Bryant to be a member of the Council of the National Library of
  Australia and to continue as a member for a period of three years from this day.

  Question—put and passed.
- 5 Suspension of standing orders—Extended time for Grievance debate: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave —That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the consideration of order of the day No. 1, government business (Grievance debate), being continued until fifteen minutes to three o'clock p.m.

Question—put and passed.

6 Public Works Committee—Report: Mr Chaney (Chairman) brought up the following report from the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works:

Report relating to the proposed Pitt Exchange Building at Sydney, New South Wales.

Ordered to be printed.

7 GRIEVANCE DEBATE: Pursuant to the provisions of standing order 106, the order of the day having been read—

Question proposed—That grievances be noted.

Debate ensued.

Question—That grievances be noted—put and passed.

8 Homes Savings Grant Bill 1967: Mr Bury (Minister representing the Minister for Housing), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Homes Savings Grant Act* 1964–1966.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Bury moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

9 NAVIGATION BILL 1967: Mr Freeth (Minister for Shipping and Transport), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Navigation Act* 1912–1966.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Freeth moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr C. K. Jones), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 SHELTERED EMPLOYMENT (ASSISTANCE) BILL 1967: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Social Services), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to provide for Assistance by the Commonwealth towards the Provision of Sheltered Employment and Accommodation for certain Disabled Persons.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Daly), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 11 Message from the Senate: A message from the Senate was reported returning the following Bill without amendment:

- 12 TARIFF BOARD REPORT—SACCHARIN, ETC.—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Howson (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise), by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

Tariff Board—Report—Saccharin, etc., and cyclamic acid—

and, by leave, made aministerial statement in connection with the report.

Ordered—That the report be printed.

- 13 Postponement of notice: Ordered—That notice No. 4, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 14 STATES GRANTS (ADVANCED EDUCATION) BILL (No. 2) 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Mr Speaker announced the receipt of message No. 7, dated 5 April 1967, from His Excellency the Governor-General recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Hulme (Postmaster-General), the Bill was read a third time.

15 STATES GRANTS BILL 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr Connor), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

16 Australian Tourist Commission Bill 1967: Mr Chipp (Minister in charge of Tourist Activities), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to establish an Australian Tourist Commission for the purpose of the encouragement of visits to Australia, and travel in Australia, by People from other Countries.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Chipp moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr J. F. Cairns), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 17 Message from the Senate: A message from the Senate was reported returning the following Bill without requests:
  - 6 April 1967—Message No. 10—Stevedoring Industry Charge 1967.

18 STATES GRANTS BILL 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Mr Speaker announced the receipt of message No. 8, dated 5 April 1967, from His Excellency the Governor-General recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Howson (Minister assisting the Treasurer), the Bill was read a third time.

19 Messages from the Senate: Messages from the Senate were reported returning the following Bills without amendment:

20 INCOME TAX (AGED PERSONS) BILL 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed by Mr Crean who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "while not opposing the passage of this Bill with its limited benefits for aged persons, this House is of opinion that the adjustment of the age allowance for tax purposes should be for the full year instead of pro-rata for ten weeks only".

Debate continued.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put. The House divided (the Speaker, Mr Aston, in the Chair)—

On the motion of Mr Howson (Minister assisting the Treasurer), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

21 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved—That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Question—That the question be now put—put and passed.

And the question—That the House do now adjourn—was put accordingly, and passed.

And then the House, at twenty-six minutes to twelve o'clock midnight, adjourned until Tuesday next at half-past two o'clock p.m.
