- 7 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—REPATRIATION PAYMENTS AND GENERAL BENEFITS: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The Government's failure to maintain the purchasing power of repatriation payments and general benefits".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

8 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 1) 1967-68: The House, according to order, resolved itself into a committee of the whole for the further consideration of the Bill.
