- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.

- 4 NATIONAL LIBRARIAN AND PARLIAMENTARY LIBRARIAN—APPOINTMENTS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Holt (Prime Minister), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House that the positions of National Librarian and Parliamentary Librarian would become separate offices from 1 January 1968, that Mr H. L. White, C.B.E. would be National Librarian, and that Mr A. P. Fleming, O.B.E. would be Parliamentary Librarian.
 - Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- 5 EDUCATION: Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) moved, pursuant to notice—That, in the opinion of this House, the Government should appoint a committee to inquire into and report upon all aspects of primary, secondary and technical education in Government and non-Government schools, and that it should adopt all the recommendations by the Martin Committee on Teacher Training.

Debate ensued.

- It being two hours after the time fixed for the meeting of the House, the debate was interrupted in accordance with standing order 109.
- Ordered—That the time for the discussion of notices be extended until fifteen minutes to one o'clock p.m.

Debate continued.

- The time allotted for precedence to general business having expired, the debate was interrupted.
- Suspension of standing orders—Extended time for debate: Mr Barnard moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the consideration of notice No. 1, general business, being continued until half-past two o'clock p.m.

Question—put and passed, with the concurrence of an absolute majority. Debate continued.

9 Banking Bill 1967: Mr Bury (Acting Treasurer), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Papua and New Guinea Development Bank and to the Australian Resources Development Bank Limited.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Bury moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 FLOOD MITIGATION WORKS ON N.S.W. COASTAL RIVERS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—
MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr Bury (Acting Treasurer), by leave, made a
ministerial statement informing the House that the Government had agreed to increase
the Commonwealth contribution for the purpose of flood mitigation works on New
South Wales coastal rivers, and, by command of His Excellency the GovernorGeneral, presented the following paper:

12 STATES GRANTS (ADVANCED EDUCATION) BILL (No. 3) 1967: Mr Forbes (Minister representing the Minister for Education and Science), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the States Grants (Advanced Education) Act 1967. Bill read a first time.

Mr Forbes moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Barnard—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 UNIVERSITIES (FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE) BILL 1967: Mr Forbes (Minister representing the Minister for Education and Science), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Financial Assistance to States in connexion with Universities.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Forbes moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr J. F. Cairns), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 SUPERANNUATION (PENSION INCREASES) BILL 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Mr Speaker announced the receipt of message No. 58, dated 5 October 1967, from His Excellency the Governor-General recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

16 PARLIAMENTARY RETIRING ALLOWANCES (INCREASES) BILL 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Mr Speaker announced the receipt of message No. 60, dated 5 October 1967, from His Excellency the Governor-General recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Howson (Minister assisting the Treasurer), the Bill was read a third time.

17 Customs Tariff Bill (No. 3) 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Ordered-That Mr J. F. Cairns be granted an extension of time.

On the motion of Mr Howson (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

18 Customs Tariff Bill (No. 4) 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Howson (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise), the Bill was read a third time.

19 CUSTOMS TARIFF BILL (No. 5) 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Howson (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise), the Bill was read a third time.

20 AGED PERSONS HOMES BILL 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

Mr Sinclair (Minister for Social Services) moved—That the Bill be now read a third time.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a third time.

21 SUGAR AGREEMENT BILL 1967: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Patterson who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "this House is of opinion that the Supplemental Sugar Agreement 1967 should be amended to provide that—

- (a) in order to end the discrimination against consumers located in Central and North Queensland because of the geographical location of Brisbane in the extreme South East corner of the State, the seaboard towns of Rockhampton and Townsville be included in the base price system applying to Australian capital cities as well as Launceston;
- (b) the costs of any additional freights associated with the inclusion of Rockhampton and Townsville in the base price system be borne by the Queensland Government from the substantial profits made annually by the State on the Central and North Queensland Railway Divisions, so that these costs are not in any way made a charge against the sugar industry which is already being charged excessive freight rates in Central and North Queensland; and
- (c) Clause 10 of the principal agreement be deleted as it is meaningless unless specifically defined, particularly as substantial losses are being currently incurred by sections of the sugar industry due to the low price on the world free market".

Debate adjourned (Mr Robinson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

22 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved—That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.
